If you have a towable RV, make sure your roadside assistance plan includes towing your RV if your vehicle breaks down.

Always Watch Your Cargo Weight

Be prepared for minor maintenance issues that arise during your travels, but don't overload or unevenly load your rig.

- Evenly space out your heavy items throughout the RV to properly distribute cargo weight.
- Separate tools into multiple storage containers and distribute throughout the external storage compartments.
- Look for compact versions of tools and tool kits whenever possible.
